Gospel Reflection

THE JOY OF LAETARE SUNDAY



Dear Friends in Christ,

Today is the Fourth Sunday of Lent and it is also called Laetare Sunday, a Sunday of joy in the middle of our Lenten journey. It is a Sunday when we take a break from Lent to see how far we have gone in the season of lent and encourage ourselves that the journey to Easter is not too far anymore. In all three readings of today we are meant to understand that God sees differently than we do, and Jesus comes to open our eyes to see the things we cannot see.

In the first reading from Book of 1 Samuel, the prophet Samuel is sent to choose a new king. When he sees Jesse's strong and impressive sons, he assumes one of them must be God's choice. But God corrects him: *"Not as man sees but as God sees, because man sees the appearance, but the Lord looks into the heart."* David, the youngest and least expected, is the one God chooses. How often do we judge by appearances? We often look at success, popularity, looks, social status, or impacts, or past mistakes. But God looks at the heart.

In the second reading from Epistle to the Ephesians, St. Paul says, *"You were once darkness, but now you are light in the Lord. Live as children of light."* That means our lives should reflect Christ. Light exposes what is hidden. Light guides. Light gives clarity. We are invited to possess the qualities of light and lead others aright. Lent is about stepping out of the darkness of sin, pride, resentment, selfishness, and choosing to live in the light.

The Gospel from John tells the powerful story of the man born blind. The disciples want to know whose fault it is. Jesus shifts the focus from blaming to healing. He restores sight physically and spiritually. He rubs mud on his eyes and asks him to go and wash in the Pool of Shiloam. How does Jesus expect the blind man to get to Shiloam when he has covered the blind man's eyes with mud? The blind man in faith, reached out to those around him for help and direction to the Pool of Shiloam. In his blindness, he expresses faith and conviction that when he gets to the pool he will see again. What's striking is this: the man who was blind begins to see clearly, not just with his eyes but with faith. Meanwhile, the Pharises, who can physically see, remain spiritually blind; They refuse to recognize Jesus. The blind man's journey mirrors our Lenten journey. At first, he simply knows the "man called Jesus" healed him. By the end, he professes faith, *"I do believe, Lord."* Lent moves us from partial sight to deeper faith.

The central message tying these readings together is this: God sees the heart, calls us out of darkness, and opens our eyes to the truth. As we move closer to Easter, this Sunday encourages us not to lose heart. God is still working on us. He is shaping our hearts like David's. He is calling us to live as children of light. He is touching our blindness and leading us to faith.

May he grant all we need in this Season of Lent that we may be stronger in faith at the end of this Season. Amen.

There is an intention to pray about on each day of the Novena.



Please join the Divine Mercy prayer group on **Good Friday, April 3**, at 11 am in the Church for the first day of the Novena. Each day the Novena will be said at 3 pm in the Chapel until Divine Mercy Sunday on April 12. Prayer guides are available in the church. (This Novena may also be prayed at home if you cannot attend in person.)



Reflexión sobre las Escrituras

LA ALEGRÍA DEL DOMINGO DE LAETARE



Queridos amigos en Cristo:

Hoy es el cuarto domingo de Cuaresma, también llamado Domingo Laetare, un domingo de alegría en medio de nuestro camino cuaresmal. Es un domingo en el que hacemos una pausa en la Cuaresma para ver cuánto hemos avanzado en este tiempo y animarnos a nosotros mismos pensando que el camino hacia la Pascua ya no está muy lejos. En las tres lecturas de hoy se nos invita a comprender que Dios ve las cosas de manera diferente a nosotros, y que Jesús viene a abrirnos los ojos para que veamos lo que no podemos ver.

En la primera lectura del Libro de 1 Samuel, el profeta Samuel es enviado a elegir un nuevo rey. Cuando ve a los fuertes e impresionantes hijos de Isaí, supone que uno de ellos debe ser la elección de Dios. Pero Dios lo corrige: «No como ve el hombre, sino como ve Dios, porque el hombre ve la apariencia, pero el Señor mira el corazón». David, el más joven y menos esperado, es el elegido por Dios. ¿Cuántas veces juzgamos por las apariencias? A menudo nos fijamos en el éxito, la popularidad, el aspecto físico, el estatus social, el impacto o los errores del pasado. Pero Dios mira el corazón.

En la segunda lectura de la Epístola a los Efesios, San Pablo dice: «Antes erais tinieblas, pero ahora sois luz en el Señor. Vivid como hijos de la luz». Eso significa que nuestras vidas deben reflejar a Cristo. La luz revela lo que está oculto. La luz guía. La luz da claridad. Se nos invita a poseer las cualidades de la luz y a guiar a los demás por el buen camino. La Cuaresma consiste en salir de la oscuridad del pecado, el orgullo, el resentimiento y el egoísmo, y elegir vivir en la luz.

El Evangelio de Juan cuenta la poderosa historia del hombre nacido ciego. Los discípulos quieren saber de quién es la culpa. Jesús cambia el enfoque de la culpa a la curación. Le devuelve la vista física y espiritualmente. Le unta barro en los ojos y le pide que vaya a lavarse al estanque de Siloé. ¿Cómo espera Jesús que el ciego llegue a Siloé cuando le ha cubierto los ojos con barro? El ciego, con fe, pidió ayuda a quienes le rodeaban para que le indicaran cómo llegar al estanque de Siloé. En su ceguera, expresa fe y convicción de que cuando llegue al estanque volverá a ver. Lo que llama la atención es esto: el hombre que era ciego comienza a ver claramente, no solo con sus ojos, sino con la fe. Mientras tanto, los fariseos, que pueden ver físicamente, permanecen espiritualmente ciegos; se niegan a reconocer a Jesús. El camino del ciego refleja nuestro camino cuaresmal. Al principio, él simplemente sabe que «el hombre llamado Jesús» lo curó. Al final, profesa su fe: «Creo, Señor». La Cuaresma nos lleva de una visión parcial a una fe más profunda.

El mensaje central que une estas lecturas es el siguiente: Dios ve el corazón, nos llama a salir de la oscuridad y nos abre los ojos a la verdad. A medida que nos acercamos a la Pascua, este domingo nos anima a no desanimarnos. Dios sigue trabajando en nosotros. Está moldeando nuestros corazones como el de David. Nos llama a vivir como hijos de la luz. Está tocando nuestra ceguera y guiándonos hacia la fe.

Que Él nos conceda todo lo que necesitamos en esta Cuaresma para que podamos fortalecer nuestra fe al final de este tiempo. Amén.




